## **PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

Mayor Woerther led the Pledge of Allegiance.

## **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

The minutes of the March 14, 2016, City Council meeting were submitted for approval. A motion was made by Council Member Cox, seconded by Council Member McGowen, to approve the minutes. A voice vote was taken with a unanimous affirmative result and the motion was declared passed.

## **PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

Ms. Joy Krieger, 534 Triton Way, introduced herself as a candidate for State Representative for District 101.

Mr. Adam Paul, Mayor of Ellisville, 1194 Oak Hill Court, made comments regarding the Environmental Stewardship Concepts (ESC) report. Mr. Paul thanked the city for taking the leadership role. Mr. Paul stated he was opposed to residential development on the site at this point and stated that in the event of legal action or litigation, the City of Ellisville would be there to support Wildwood.

Ms. Barbara Sprenger, 84 Strecker Road, spoke in opposition of delisting the Callahan site.

Ms. Tammy Shea, Ward 3, stated she appreciated Dr. deFur's report and the Council's inquiries. Ms. Shea spoke regarding her concerns about the five year review, incomplete data, distrust of the EPA and other concerns. Ms. Shea asked what the next step was.

Ms. Jean Vedvig, 16709 Clayton Road, spoke regarding her concerns about the site. Ms. Vedvig stated if the city would not have worked so hard with the EPA and DNR, then we wouldn't be here today. Ms. Vedvig encouraged everyone to be involved and to have our own experts.

Mr. Dan Topik, 1576 Englebrook Drive, thanked the city for the effort in bringing back Dr. deFur to help answer questions. Mr. Topik stated they just learned that trenches were dug and chemicals poured in on the Bliss site and then a barn was built on top of it. Mr. Topik thanked City Administrator Thomas on the proposed amendment to the Hunting and Gun Regulations. Mr. Topik also spoke of the overpopulation of deer and stated he felt the city should work with the Department of Conservation on the issue.

Mr. Carl Altman, 236 Strecker Farms Ct., stated he was frustrated after an EPA meeting a few years ago. Mr. Altman stated everyone at the meeting knew it was flawed and it was obvious they had no intention of cleaning the property to residential standards. Mr. Altman stated he would prefer if they are not going to clean it, that they just leave it alone. Mr. Altman thanked the city for not giving up and stated we should make the EPA be accountable for this.

Ms. Mary Morton, 211 Strecker Farms Ct., thanked the Council for asking great questions and thanked Dr. deFur. Ms. Morton spoke about her concerns regarding water flow and the barn. Ms. Morton wonders what we can do to encourage folks around there to protect their homes and families.

Mr. Joe Pirrello, 276 Strecker Farms, spoke regarding accusations that were going around about him and his campaign. Mr. Pirrello stated he had nothing but respect for Mr. Manton. Mr. Pirrello stated someone cut the sign in his own front yard. Mr. Pirrello stated he hoped everyone understood he has run a clean campaign.

Ms. Julie Furtwengler, 252 Strecker Farms Ct., spoke about her concerns that there is no sidewalk along Strecker and asked if there was any discussion on placing sidewalks there.

## **OTHER**

### **APPROVAL OF EXPENDITURES (Wards – All)**

A motion was made by Council Member Cullinane, seconded by Council Member Bertolino, to approve the expenditures. A voice vote was taken with a unanimous affirmative result and the motion was declared passed.

### **Receipt and File – A Recommendation Report of the Planning and Zoning Commission on Phase II of the Community Park; Approving the Site Development Plan. (Wards – All)**

Director of Planning Vujnich stated the Planning and Zoning Commission members reviewed the Site Development Plan (SDP) that was submitted for its review and action. Director of Planning Vujnich stated the Commission is supportive of the approximately 3,200 foot long access roadway and companion trail, which includes the preparation of the Great Meadow Area as well. Director of Planning Vujnich stated the Planning and Zoning Commission completed its review of the Site Development Plan (SDP) and related items and determined them to be in compliance with the requirements for the development of them in the City's community park area. Director of Planning Vujnich stated based upon the analysis provided in the report, the Planning and Zoning Commission granted its approval of the Site Development Plan for the proposed trail project.

### **Receipt and File – A Recommendation Report of the Planning and Zoning Commission for P.Z. 21, 22, and 23-14 Stone Mill; approving the Site Development Plan package for a twelve (12) lot residential subdivision located at the terminus of Center Avenue. (Ward – Eight)**

Director of Planning Vujnich stated the Site Plan Subcommittee of the Planning and Zoning Commission considered the submitted plans, which includes the Site Development Plan (SDP) and related items and believes them to be in compliance with the site-specific ordinance governing this property and the City's Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision and Development Regulations. Director of Planning Vujnich stated this compliance leads the members of the Site Plan Subcommittee to support approval of this complement of plans, thereby allowing the Department of Planning to sign and release them.

## **CONTINUED FROM WORK SESSION**

### **CITY ADMINISTRATOR DISCUSSION ITEMS**

#### **Request for Building Permit Authorization – 18634 Hawks Trail Drive (Ward – Six)**

Director of Planning Vujnich stated the owner of a vacant lot wants to sell it and wants to make sure the buyer will be able to get a building permit. Director of Planning Vujnich briefly reviewed the background of Hawks Trail Drive. Director of Planning Vujnich stated the Department was asking for direction from the City Council. Director of Planning Vujnich presented a few options for the City Council to consider.

Discussion was held regarding the following: what is the approximate cost to bring the road up to city standard; bids in 2012 were approximately \$22,000; who maintains the road going forward; who would repair it in the future; eventually it would be the Homeowners Association; what is the Department's recommendation; the Department feels we should issue a building permit (item 5) and have the owners provide a prorated share of the cost; think item 6 should be applied in the form of an escrow; can't see doing liens; I think we should rule out item 1; can issue permits and state the road is in 'as is' condition.

A motion was made by Council Member Marshall, seconded by Council Member Bowlin, to support the Department of Planning's recommendation in implementing what they find is the best solution and to include a catch-all to address items

that have not been thought of or addressed regarding the city's responsibility. A voice vote was taken with a unanimous affirmative result and the motion was declared passed.

#### **COMMITTEE ACTION ITEM(S)/RECOMMENDATION(S)**

##### **Update on Rural Internet Access Project (Wards – All)**

Director of Planning and Parks Vujnich noted a memorandum had been provided for the City Council's review and that he was available to answer any questions they may have regarding the Rural Internet Access Project.

##### **Administration/Public Works Committee Salary Plan Update (Wards – All)**

City Administrator Thomas stated an Employee Compensation & Benefits Study was completed by CBIZ Human Capital Services. City Administrator Thomas stated based on the study, a 2016 Salary Plan was prepared for inclusion in the 2016 Municipal Budget document. City Administrator Thomas stated the Administration/Public Works Committee recommended adopting the 2016 Salary Plan and to complete another update at the beginning of the 2017 Budget Review process.

Discussion was held regarding the following: what is the time frame between the starting, middle and end point of a salary range; an individual can get hired at any point in the range; will review during the upcoming budget review process.

##### **Board of Public Safety Proposed Update to Hunting and Firearms Regulations (Wards – All)**

City Administrator Thomas stated the prepared segregated code was reviewed, which provided for a single code section specific to hunting and a separate section specific to firearms. City Administrator Thomas stated the new firearms section was updated to comply with current State Statutes. City Administrator Thomas stated the Board of Public Safety was recommending that legislation be prepared to adopt the proposed amended code, as written, except that "(including in excess of twenty-two (.22) caliber)" be removed from Section 6g of the Hunting Regulations, as it is not necessary due to all air guns being permitted east of Missouri Route 109.

Discussion was held regarding the following: would like to make a recommendation that the Board of Public Safety look at firearms being discharged in Town Center; citywide there is a three acre minimum lot size for hunting.

A motion was made by Council Member Goodson, seconded by Council Member Garritano, to have the Board of Public Safety review the firearms regulations for areas immediately in the Town Center area east of Route 109. A voice vote was taken with a negative result and the motion failed (Goodson and Garritano voted Aye).

A motion was made by Council Member Marshall, seconded by Council Member Dodwell, to prepare legislation to adopt the proposed amended code. A voice vote was taken with an affirmative result and the motion was declared passed (Goodson Abstained).

##### **Planning/Economic Development/Parks Committee Special Event Liquor License for the Wildwood Farmers Market – 2016 (Ward – Eight)**

Director of Planning Vujnich stated the Committee believed the request of the managers can be authorized for the 2016 Season, thereby allowing the market and its customers another option for enjoying this venue over its season, and the City of Wildwood. Director of Planning Vujnich stated that at its March 15, 2016 meeting, and by a vote of 6 to 0, the Committee recommended the City Council approve this additional allowance for beer and wine sales at certain special events held in conjunction with the weekly farmers market.

Discussion was held regarding the following: wine and beer at 8:30 a.m. or would they extend the Farmers Market hours for those special events; define special events; cooking demonstrations; wine tasting; and the city has to approve the special event; each time they have one of these events, it has to be approved.

A motion was made by Council Member Baugus, seconded by Council Member Manton, to authorize the Department of Planning to prepare legislation and to incorporate what the Committee has come up with. A voice vote was taken with an affirmative result and the motion was declared passed (McCutchen voted Nay.)

#### **Al Foster Memorial Trailhead Bid Results for Project's Construction (Ward – Six)**

Director of Planning Vujnich reviewed the recommendation from the Planning/Economic Development/Parks Committee. Director of Planning Vujnich stated the Committee, acting at its March 15, 2016 meeting, and by a vote of 6 to 0, is recommending Ideal Landscaping for this construction project. Director of Planning Vujnich stated that with City Council's endorsement, the contract for this project could be established by the end of April, with construction starting in late spring/early summer.

A motion was made by Council Member Cullinane, seconded by Council Member Manton, to prepare legislation to enter into a contract with Ideal Landscaping. A voice vote was taken with a unanimous affirmative result and the motion was declared passed.

#### **On-Going and Long-Term Maintenance Costs for Parks and Trail Facilities (Wards – All)**

Director of Planning and Parks Vujnich noted a memorandum had been provided for the City Council's review and that he was available to answer any questions they may have regarding the On-Going and Long-Term Maintenance Costs for Parks and Trail Facilities.

**CITY ADMINISTRATOR DISCUSSION ITEMS**

**Presentation of the Final Report from Environmental Stewardship Concepts (ESC) regarding the Ellisville Superfund Site by Dr. Peter deFur (Ward – Two)**

Dr. Peter deFur, Environmental Stewardship Concepts (ESC), gave background on ESC and himself. Dr. deFur presented the report from ESC regarding the Ellisville Superfund Site. Dr. deFur pointed out the major observations, concerns and conclusions and new things discovered since the cleanup. Dr. deFur reviewed their recommendations.

Discussion was held regarding the following: encountered soil with color, odor and debris; found contamination at six feet; anything occurring at Callahan could run down to the creek; EPA found evidence that other chemicals were present; concern is the samples that had concentrations of dioxin higher than the cleanup criteria and they left them there; my concern is when you build houses that dirt eight feet below now becomes the yard; how would you do a five year review with houses in place; have only addressed dioxin, what about all of the other stuff; want EPA to do their job;

have the standards changed since the original clean up thirty-five years ago, (yes); want to make certain the EPA does what it needs to do here, we need to present good evidence; there are things to address in the report; were you able to contact EPA before compiling this report, or can you do that before the final report; what EPA has suggested was a deed restriction that would give forewarning but from what you have said, that is not effective; could focus on the part of the problem we know exists: contamination in the corner is more than the cleanup standard; also focus on the five year review; that can be addressed with elected officials; we haven't really disturbed the soil, if houses were being built, there is potential for dust to migrate, the construction crews aren't going to know to be careful with that; they have a requirement that construction crews have training so they know what discolored or disturbed soil looks like; can this site ever be clean to a safe standard, especially since contamination has spread; don't know, don't know how deep contamination is with the ground water; recommend against delisting the Callahan site; regarding the monitoring wells, would you suggest waiting on groundwater monitoring wells removal; yes, it is premature to remove the monitoring wells.
